Pattengill Middle School hosted a tournament for the Capitol Area Speech and Debate League (CASDL) on Jan. 28, 2012. Four Jaycees attended as judges -- Lori Casteline, Michael P. Leeds, Abby siegel and myself attended. The judging pool was tight, every last person was needed for judging. The events held were 3-person debate, Original Prose & Poetry, Duo Improvisation, and Oral Interpritation of Literature.

Fun was had by all who attended. Most Jaycees who participated said they would like to judge again. Abby Siegel pointed out that "It is great that kids this age are doing speech and debate. I wish I had the courage to do this when I was young."

Judging proved to be more challenging that one might think. Often times, both teams make good points on either side of the topic, making it not so cut and dry to determine which side won. Generally, though, it was possible to determine a winner by asking "which side causes the greatest good to the greatest number of people, considering the disadvantages of their approach?"

The topic for the first two debates was "Student lockers are

PRIVATE." Each team took sides defending the statement, called the resolution, and opposing it. Arguments in favor of the topic centered on privacy and student rights. Arguments in opposition were that locker searches promote safety from guns and drugs and other undesireable material. For the last two debates, the resolution was "Freedom of speech ends at the schoolhouse door." Academic freedom and free speech was the ground for the team affirming the resolution. Negating the resolution, arguments were made about the consequences of speech and why absolute free speech could be bad.

Care for your towels

February is here and soon it will be time to do some spring cleaning. In an effort to get ready to do such, take a good hard look in your linen closet and get it updated. Below are some tips on towels (watch for sheets next month) gathered from All You Magazine (Nov. 2011).

What Towels to Purchase: Choose white or a light color for everyday use, darker colors typically do not soften up until after several washes. Check the texture of the towel. The loops, which determine absorbency, should be thick and lightly packed. The closer the loops, the more absorbent it will be. Check out your current towels, if you can see the base of the towel, time to get some new ones. Look for 100% combed cotton terry cloth, which is the most absorbent and great for regular use. As we all know, thickness is a matter of personal preference...500 to 700 grams is standard, a good salesperson should be able to tell you. Avoid a less expensive towel (typically a cotton-polyester blend); synthetic fiber polyester is less absorbent. Other blends such as bamboo-cotton and modal-cotton are both soft and absorbent.

Storing Towels: Store your towels in a clean, dry place. Shelves are the best, if you must use a drawer line it first. Wood drawers can cause discoloration and leave towels stained. Remove towels promptly from the dryer to reduce wrinkling. To maximize your space, use the same folding method for all towels (quarters, thirds, etc.). Do not stack your towels too high (don't squash um), stack no more than four high.

Keeping Towels Fresh: Always spread your damp towel out to dry after use. If the towel is completely dry before your next use, you can use it again (up to a week). If your towel does not dry between uses, bacteria can build up. Make sure your towels are completely dry before putting in your hamper.

Don't fill your washer more than 70% of capacity with towels, they are heavy and need room to move. Wash with like colors (try not to wash with your clothes or you may find lint all over them) with warm water and a cold rinse. Softeners are great to make your towels smell good, however after time usage results in a less absorbent towel. Instead, place a few sachets of your favorite scent in your linen closet. Be sure to

promptly remove your towels from the washing machine, bacteria can start breeding on damp towels in an hour or two. Make sure your towels are dry when you remove them, never fold and store them while still damp.
