After four years of participating in Relay for Life, I will tell you that this once-a-year fundraiser has become a way of life for me. There are two parts to my year: Getting ready for Relay and thinking about getting ready for Relay. In any case, there are a few bits of time-tested (after four years, something can be time-tested, right?) knowledge to pass along.

- 1. **Expect wind.** At the Relay for Life of Lansing's current location, wind is inevitable. Wind prevented our team from putting up too many decorations this year. A good Mardi Gras time was still had by all, of course, because it was our team's theme, but it was done without many visual components.
- 2. **Expect emotion.** There is so much more to Relay than walking in a circle. There are three ceremonies throughout the 24 hour event. The first is Celebrate, where we celebrate those who have fought cancer and survived. They walk a lap to the cheering of everyone present,

The third ceremony is called Fight Back, this is where we all pledge to do what we can to fight against cancer. Quit smoking, lose weight, join American Cancer Society by being a volunteer in one of their many programs.

3. Expect FUN! Another aspect of Relay besides walking is all the activites and fundraisers going on. Each team is encouraged to have both a fundraiser and an activity members from other teams can join. Again this year, the Lansing Jaycees sold s'mores. We also had a Mardi Gras parade around the track to "When the Saints Come Marching In". Other teams had candy and cookies for sale, others were selling floating lanterns, and the Cooley Law School students put people in "jail" for a fee. To keep ourselves awake, we had activities all night long, including line dancing and the ever popular Miss Relay.

INDIVIDUAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT

He-Man

I'll focus this article on He-Man language and its critics.

I originally sought to write an article using only masculine pronouns. It started with "Man must understand language to establish thought." And the whole thing was going to point out the problems of exclusionary language. As my PC crashed, I instead submit the following arguments:

- 1. He-Man language that refers only to men as the generic pronouns is exclusionary and makes women linguistically invisible. Words like mankind suppose to speak for all people, but in reality, it creates a discourse where only men are considered.
- 2. Language constructs reality. In Man Made Language (1980), Dale Spender wrote:
- "Language is our means of classifying and ordering the world: our means of manipulating reality. In its structure and in its use we bring our world into realisation, and if it is inherently inaccurate, then we are misled. If the rules which underlie our language system, our symbolic order, are invalid, then we are daily deceived."
- 3. Reality bites. Gender inequality in language spills over to gender inequality in life. This language makes the male-as-norm, allowing for some forms of patriarchy to be mainifested. For example, Susan Brooks Thistlethwaite, wrote in Theology Today (1987):

When a corporation head decides to hire "the best man for the job," women have stopped wondering why they are not hired. Economic exclusivity depends on linguistic exclusivity.

- 4. The solution is for man to stop using gendered language himself. (See how weird He-Man language is?) But what are we to do for historic works that use He-Man language? The options are:
- (a) We can throw out the works entirely, such as the Bible or the Declaration of Independence and the Jaycees creed.



- (b) We could just continue using the text as is, perpetuating patriarchal sayings like "a man's home is his castle".
- (c) Change the words and meaning of historic documents.
- (d) Use Sous Rature to strike out the word implying that it is inaccurate, but still using it, as it is necessary. Jacques Derrida was a big fan of this type of approach. While this may not solve for the spoken word, it is a start.

Treasurer's Report

Happy almost half done with the year to you all! I hate to say it but the summer is flying by and it isn't technically here yet...

I know you are all just waiting for some more helpful hints and tips from my source (All You magazine, November 18, 2011) and I so here you go!

Hard to Handle Things...

Splinter be Gone: Put a piece of tape (masking or Scotch) over the splinter then pull off.

Can't Hold Hand Tools in Place: Rub white chalk on the tip of your screwdriver to help hold it in place.

Size Matters

This is a problem that has been bugging me for years. I'm sure a scientist well versed in optics could give me a satisfying answer but as of now no answer has been forthcoming.

Start with the fact that the world is made of things of varying sizes. Some of these things are big enough to see like apple, chairs and Jaycees chaplains while others are to small to see like bacteria, dust mites and blood cells.

If we consider those things we can see we can discern parts: the stem of the apple, the leg of the chair, the nose of the chaplain. But even of things with not obvious part we can still visual divide the object. A rock does not have stems, or legs, or noses but we can nonetheless think of 'this half' and 'that half' of the rock. If we are seeing a thing we are seeing half of the thing. Even for something very small (yet visible) like a grain of sand we can still mentally divide and see halves of the object.

Since size is a widely varying scale visible things range from the very large, like Ayer's Rock and very small like sand. Likewise the world of non-visible things has a scale. Dust mites are bigger than bacteria and white blood cells are bigger than red blood cells. It stands to reason that there is a threshold

at which an object is just to small to see; if it were any bigger at all we could see it. No doubt the size at which an object moves from non-visible to visible will vary from person to person based on one's visual acuity but nonetheless for each person such a threshold exists.

By this reasoning there possibly exists some object, let's call it X, which is just small enough that I cannot see it. If X were any bigger at all I would be able to see it. Perhaps not see it easily but see it nonetheless. Here's the problem: what happens if X were twice as big (lets call this 2X)? Since I could see X were it any bigger at all I could certainly see it if it was doubled in size. Since I can see it, I can see it as parts or discern halves. But if I can discern halves of 2X I can see something the size of X because X is the size of half of 2X. What was a non-visible size on its own is now a visible size as part of a larger object. How is this

possible? Seriously, anyone? I have no idea. If you do please tell me because this is the kind of thing that keeps philosophers like me up at night.
