United States Jaycees National Convention

The U.S. Jaycees 91st Annual Meeting (AI(AGO 2011) JUNE 8-12 I traveled to Lisle, Illinois, near Chicago, June 7 through 12 to attend the 2011 US Jaycees National Convention with 18 others from Michigan Jaycees chapters. Those who attended had a full week of events. Individuals who won their state competitions began the week Wednesday meeting one another then giving their best at their speak-up, write-up, and interviews. As the Michigan Jaycees speak-up winner, I had a couple of weeks to prepare a five to seven minute speech based on a question given to me. I did my very best, and although I did not win the award for 2010 Speak-up, I was honored to represent our state and Lansing Jaycees in the competition. There was a fantastic assortment of individuals; each person I heard had a thought provoking and sometimes humorous response to our prepared question.

There were awards beyond the individual and team competition. Similar to our state awards program, the US Jaycees honor states and chapters in areas of excellence. It was an honor to witness Julie Abshire, from the Wyandotte Jaycees, receive the prestigious Harold A. Marks Award for top chapter of 2010. WOW! That's right – the #1 chapter in the country! All of us were so excited for her!

There were fantastic trainings at the convention. Much like our state trainings, they revolved around becoming better leaders for our chapter and local community. I had an opportunity to watch Jay Johnson, President of the Redford Jaycees, give his exceptional Body Language workshop. The audience loved it and he was spot on with his presentation. This was the same workshop he presented for the Lansing Jaycees in March, which won the Michigan Jaycees 1st Quarter Professional Development Award. Another training I enjoyed was the "Put a Ring on it...Member Engagement" workshop where I learned a lot about what motivates today's Jaycees member, how better to serve them, and how best to engage them. In fact, we had a surprise at that

workshop as Junior Chamber International (JCI) President Kentaro Harada, from Japan, crashed our meeting and gave a short but inspiring speech about helping others learn to have hope. As you may recall, Japan had a devastating earthquake and tsunami earlier this year. It was a pleasure meeting someone who was from that country and had the courage to step up and continue being an international leader even amongst the tragic event earlier this year. I was quite excited meeting our current international president, knowing that the \$539.04 raised at our Comedy for A Cause fundraiser earlier this year would benefit his home countrymen and women.





One of the biggest impacts the convention had on me was the experience of meeting individuals from chapters throughout the country. While the mid-west was well represented, there was a flock of individuals who came to the convention from states far away, including Hawaii. Many states had a signature drink and Hawaii had theirs. Their signature drink, Banzai, came with a crazy ritual that – I won't spoil it for you – included: a large intricately designed bowl filled with their special mixture, mixture infused fruit, ridiculous chants, and a pair of Hawaiian Jaycees playfully mocking your unworthiness. If you meet their challenge you will be deemed worthy of the full Banzai experience. Unfortunately for me, there was some miscommunication. You see, I did it in the



exact opposite order. When I later asked a Hawaii Jaycees member about this their eyes turned fearful – no one had ever done it backwards to the best of their knowledge. I am not sure if this had jinxed me or not. We may never know! The night was one to remember, though. In fact, I had a second initiation at the National Convention. I had never been properly Woo'd! The Region C Jaycees hosted the Michigan Woo party. Matt Sernau and Dave Worthams conducted the ceremony. Over 40 people were initiated to Woo including me, the 2011 US Jaycee President Joanie Cramer, and 2011 Junior Chamber International President, Kentaro Harada, of Japan. It was a great night being officially indoctrinated to the Woo clan along with them!

While the honor of representing Michigan in the competitions may have been what brought me to my first convention, it was the JCI Ten Outstanding Young Americans (TOYA) formal banquet that inspired me to attend future National Conventions. Hearing the story of these ten outstanding young people truly inspired me to do more. While some of their stories were heartbreaking, all of them were inspiring. One of the recipients, Lisa Miller, is a resident of Kalamazoo. After convention she later joined the Kalamazoo Jaycees. Way to go! A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD

What's in Your Jaycee Future? "As for the future, your task is not to foresee it, but to enable it." - Antoine de Saint-Exupery

It's that time of year. The time where we start thinking about what we want to do as Jaycees in the next few months, next year, and in the future. As I'm serving my second year on the Michigan Jaycees Board of Directors, I've been asked about my experience. In thinking about this, I went back and did some research on Lansing Jaycees who have served at the MIJC level and how it relates to my personal experience.

In the past, we've had many members serve as Region Directors (RD). Currently our chapter is part of Region D, which encompasses the chapters of Lansing, Ionia and Charlotte. RDs are responsible for visiting their assigned chapters, helping with membership, and being a support system for chapters. Throughout the years, regions have changed as the organization has changed, so it's always possible for there to be a different number of chapters in each region.


After I served as 81st President of the Lansing Jaycees, I needed something to do during my year as Chair of the Board. So I decided to run for RD, and was elected to serve in that role in 2010. I had a little experience during my year as president to meet some of the other presidents in our region, which helped me transition into the RD role. It was a great way to get to know members from other chapters and work with other RDs and board members from around the state.

Statewide Vice President positions were not created until the 1961-62 Jaycee year. Prior to that year, what we know today as District or Region directors, were called Vice Presidents. Since these positions were created, Lansing has had only a few members serve in these roles. In 1981-82, the 51st President of the Lansing Jaycees, Duane Humphrey, served as the MIJC Community Action Vice President. Dave Allen, 60th Lansing Jaycees President, served as West Area Vice President from 1989-90 and Community Vice President in 1990-91 (is anyone sensing a pattern?).

After my year as RD, I was inspired to do more. For those of you that know me, community is very important to me – whether it's my role at work (nonprofit and government experience), where I live, or what I do in my spare time. I also wanted to follow in the footsteps of one of my mentors, Kris Collee, who served as the 2010 MIJC Community Development Vice President (CDVP). As I've reached the halfway point in my year as CDVP, I can tell you that it's a lot of fun, yet it's a lot of work. I've been lucky to travel all over the state and see our 41 chapters do amazing things. I've met a lot of great people and hope that in some way, I've inspired them – to do a new project, to run for an office, or just to step outside their comfort zone a bit.

And I would be remiss if I didn't talk about a couple more offices. Since Martin P. Luthy served as the first president of the Michigan Jaycees in 1925-26, the Lansing Jaycees have had eight members serve as MIJC President. The last Lansing Jaycee to serve in this capacity was 68th MIJC President Dave Allen in 1991-1992. Prior to that, it was William Kutchey in 1956-57 as the 33rd President of the Michigan Jaycees. Our chapter has also had the honor of having the 29th President of the United State Junior Chamber as a member. Paul Bagwell served in this role in 1948-49.

So, the question is – what will you do with your time in the Jaycees? Wherever your leadership, friendship, and sense of citizenship lead you, I hope you enjoy the journey.

Coaching In Your Inbox: Your Declaration of Independence & Inner Freedom

In the spirit of the Fourth of July, let's talk this month about Freedom and Independence.

At some point when we grow up, we decide we have to "settle down," become responsible, do what we need to do to pay the bills. We get a job, we wear the right clothes, we behave ourselves. Well, I'm here to tell you that's not where it's at. Now, don't get me wrong: I am not advocating going AWOL on your taxes or not paying the rent/mortgage. But on the other hand, I think too many good peeps out there are feeling stuck, underutilized, uninspired. If this is you, and if you want things to change, the place to look is your sense of inner freedom.

One of my favorite coaching tools, courtesy of my favorite coaching teacher Martha Beck, is the distinction between the Essential Self and the Social Self. It is made up of your natural skills, talents, preferences, strengths (and weaknesses) – what makes you the fabulous you that you are. The social self, on the other hand, is the part of you that was developed in response to your environment and its cues. Your social self keeps you out of trouble, and its main concern is to make sure you are safe and UNDER THE RADAR. Your social self quickly learned that making parents or teachers mad was a recipe for disaster, so it made sure you followed the rules. The problem is that you learned most of these rules when you were 6, and here you are at 32, still feeling trapped by a bad case of the SHOULDS.

Sometimes we need to make a big change in our life. Sometimes we really do need a new job, or it would be a good idea to move across the country, or what have you. Other times, we need to rearrange our perception of the situation. As my friend Scott told me just yesterday: "The way you relate to the issue IS the issue." Whether it's actually taking action in the world, or cleaning out some old beliefs and mental patterns, the goal is to have a sense of inner freedom.

So if you are feeling like you'd like to craft your own personal Declaration of Independence and Inner Freedom, here's a few suggestions of what you could do. (Notice I didn't say "should.")

- 1. Notice where your social self is dictating your life.
- 2. Do some journaling and ask your essential self to speak. What do you REALLY want?
- 3. Visit Byron Katie's website and learn how to challenge your thoughts. (thework.com)
- 4. Make a list of your core values. Notice where you're out of alignment.
- 5. Do one small thing you've been meaning to do for a long time that will make you feel happy.
- 6. Write your personal manifesto. Share it with one good friend.

<u>www.paperbackswap.com</u> – Readers post unwanted books, when it is requested, you pay to ship it then receive a credit that you use to acquire a book from someone else.

<u>www.listia.com</u> – A free auction site where you can post anything you don't want. Bid on items using credits earned for signing up, referring friends or listing your own stuff.

<u>www.ebay.com</u> – Unload your collectibles, name-brand clothing, small electronics and other items here. Post your item, pay the fee and wait to see if it sells.

<u>www.craigslist.org</u> – Find furniture, appliances, cars, etc. that are in your area. Friday afternoon and Saturday mornings are the best time to post your item. Be open to negotiation. (Favorite site of mine as I sold my car there a few years ago within 3 days of posting it).

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
