
We're hoping this project will allow many of our members to get involved in some small way!

Approximately one million pull tabs = 800 pounds

Approximately 1,430 pull tabs = one pound

Approximately 63,360 pull tabs = 1 mile

I went there first with my mom and had the most amazing pumpkin bisque. It was like warm pumpkin pie, comfort in a bowl. They even served it with a dollop of fresh whipped cream.
