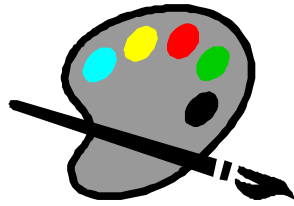
## Locks of Love Project in the works!

Locks of Love is a non-profit organization that provides hairpieces to financially disadvantaged children under the age of 18 who have long term medical hair loss from chemotherapy or other medical conditions such as alopecia. The following are the guidelines from the Locks of Love website, [www.locksoflove.com](http://www.locksoflove.com):

- 10 inch minimum hair length (tip to tip), not wigs, falls or synthetic hair.
- Please bundle hair in ponytail or braid.
- Hair needs to be clean, dry, placed in a plastic bag, then a padded envelope.
- Hair from men and women, young and old, all colors and races.
- Hair may be colored or permed, but not bleached or chemically damaged (if unsure, ask your stylist).
- Hair swept off the floor is not usable.
- Hair cut years ago is usable if it has been stored in a ponytail or braid.
- Hair that is short, gray or unsuitable for children will be separated from the ponytails and sold at fair market value to offset the cost of manufacturing.
- You may pull curly hair straight to measure the minimum 10 inches.
- The majority of all hair donated comes from children who wish to help other children.
- Layered hair may be divided into multiple ponytails for donation.
- Please note: Anyone can cut your hair as long as the above guidelines are followed.

Three members have already committed to growing their hair for this project, including Amy Miller, Dianne Perukel and Tracy Prush! Please join us in supporting this great organization. We are seeking a co-sponsor for this event, such as a salon or several independent cosmetologists. The event will be held near the end of the year in November or December, to give people ample time to grow their hair long enough to make a donation! ### International Community Service Fair

Project Green, a student run organization, sponsored by the Lear Career Services Center at MSU, wrapped up their year with an International Community Service Fair on Saturday, April 22. Since 2001 Project Green has focused on gathering students, businesses and community members in order to make in difference in the Lansing area. Starting as a single event, over the past five years Project Green has grown rapidly, and hosted t10 events in the 2005-2006 year. Projects this year included a safe Halloween party, a food and clothing drive, ice skating with students of Willow Elementary, volunteering at the Pekham holiday party, hosting a blood drive, a Valentine's party with elementary children and a date auction to fund the heating of homes in the Lansing area.

For the final event this year over 300 MSU students, 75 corporate representatives and 60 community members worked together during Project Green's International Community Service Fair. Fleece blankets were made for orphanages in Guatemala and Mexico, health kits were put together for residents of Thailand and China, volunteers wrote greeting cards for a children's hospital in Australia, recorded books on tape for a blind hospital in England and compiled school kits for less fortunate African nations. Participants also planted flowers and painted flowerpots to be distributed in their local community.

Walking around the event, each station was decorated with a cultural feel, ethnic food was served, and cultural entertainment was provided throughout the day. The event was successful in exposing volunteers to different cultures, creating a collaborative effort and making a difference beyond borders.

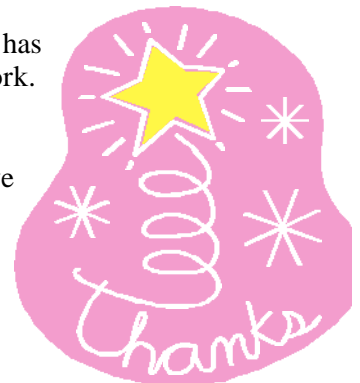

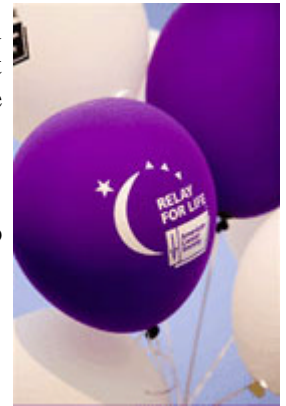
## Relay for Life

On May 21, from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m., at 621, a benefit performance by The Nupoet Collective and Five Deep will be featured at One Mic One Life, a non-smoking event with proceeds to go to the Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence and Eve's House specifically to help victims of domestic and sexual violence. The goal for the evening, according to event organizer Rina Risper, is to raise \$2,000 for these worthy organizations. Last year our charity was the American Cancer Society.

Rina Risper, President and Publisher of The New Citizens Press said, "As a survivor of domestic violence, I know what it is like to be homeless and afraid. Eve's House provided shelter and MCADSV's determination to change how our society views victims through pushing for legislation probably saved my life. People should not ask why don't abused leave, they should ask why the abuser keeps abusing."

## **What exactly is Domestic Violence?**

Domestic violence constitutes the willful intimidation, assault, battery, sexual assault or other abusive behavior perpetrated by one family member, household member or intimate partner against another. In most state laws addressing domestic violence, the relationship necessary for a charge of domestic assault or abuse generally includes a spouse, former spouse, persons currently residing together or those that have within the previous year, or persons who share a common child. In addition, as of 1997, a significant number of states have included dating relationships in their statutory definitions of domestic relationships.

## **More than you know**

Nearly 1 in 4 American women between the ages of 18 and 65 has experienced domestic violence (Body Shop, 1998).

In 1996, there were nearly 840,000 female victims and approximately 150,000 male victims of intimate violence (Greenfield, et al, 1998).

In 48 percent of all violent victimizations during 1996, the victim knew the offender.

The MCADSV is a statewide membership organization whose members represent a network of over 70 domestic and sexual violence programs and over 200 allied organizations and individuals. We have provided leadership as the statewide voice for survivors of domestic and sexual violence and the programs that serve them since 1978. MCADSV is dedicated to the empowerment of all the state's survivors of domestic and sexual violence. Our mission is to develop and promote efforts aimed at the elimination of all domestic and sexual violence in Michigan. Eve's house is a safe haven for women who are or were victims of domestic violence.

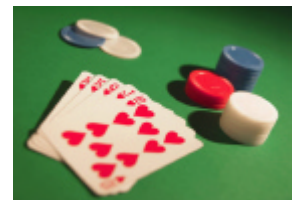
