

The Right Time to Shop

Did you ever stop and wonder if there is a perfect time of year to buy something and why? HGTV has concluded that there is. I hope you find this excerpt from HGTV Magazine as interesting as I did.

January: Fitness Equipment – timed to coincide with all of our New Year's resolutions and Linens – marked down to increase business during the slow season (next mark down will be spring when retailers are trying to sell their winter stock).

February: Cameras – new models come out so the old ones are cheaper and Televisions – can you say Super Bowl, what better reason for a TV to be on sale.

March: Garden and Lawn Care Products – retailers lower their prices to compete for your spring fever and Luggage – the holiday travel season is over resulting in lower demand for luggage and lower prices.

April: Vacuums – new models come out in June so they are trying to get rid of the old and home accessories – stores want your gifting money for events like Mother's Day and graduations so they are competing for your business (20 percent savings or more).

May: Outdoor Grills – price cuts are given as outdoor entertaining gets under way and Annual Flowers and Vegetables – generally discounted 30 to 50 percent in May or June due to the end of planting season.

June: Dishware – hello wedding season, find markdowns near 50 percent on china, dishes, flatware and glassware and Tools – hand and power tools are discounted for Father's Day, they will go on sale again between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

July: Paint – homeowners take advantage of warm weather to tackle outdoor paint jobs (January is also a good month due to New Year's home improvement resolutions) and Mattresses – funny as it sounds, retailers have a tradition to offer steep discounts around patriotic holidays (4th Day) to lure people into stores when they have time off.

August: Computers – students are going back to school and the new models come out, time to sell the old (also on sale when updated operating systems come out) and Perennials and Shrubs – often half off at the end of summer for about a month before the first frost so nurseries can clear out their stock.

September: Furniture – Labor Day brings sales on beds, bookcases and chairs. Discounts may deepen in fall and winter, but so does the selection and Outdoor Furniture – from Labor Day thru October find discounts from 15 to 20 percent off in cold climates and early summer in warmer climates.

October: Cookware – just in time for the holidays look for starter sets where you will pay 25 percent less than if you purchased them separately (mid-May is another sale, but shorter) and Camping and Outdoor Gear – camping season is over, time to get the gear off the shelves with discounts of up to 30 percent off. November: New Cars – car dealers want to end their year on a high note so sales are the best here (also good July 4 thru August) and Appliances – small appliances go on sale near major holidays when they are trying to entice shoppers into their stores (refrigerators go on sale in May).

December: Air Conditioners – demand is low so units may be on sale for up to 20 percent off, since they are typically only sold April through September prices will fall and Wall-To-Wall Carpeting – spending on home goods dies down so most carpet retailers will negotiate up to 20 percent off carpet and installation to drum up business.
