### **Outstanding Young Michigander** Two Lansing Area Residents to be Honored

The Michigan Junior Chamber's Outstanding Young Michigander (OYM) and Distinguished Service Awards Program started in 1955 to recognize outstanding community leaders age 21 to 40 years old from around the state of Michigan. The program honors up to five OYMs and five Distinguished Service Awards (DSA) annually who exemplify the best attributes of the state's young people. Honorees selected in past years have represented the heights of progress in all human endeavors. Many have gone on to even greater achievements. All have continued to serve humanity in a great variety of ways.

OYM and DSA recipients will be honored at a ceremony held on Nov. 15 at the Old Town Marquee in Lansing. The ceremony will highlight each winner's career in narrative form and provide a stage from which the honorees can challenge and inspire young people from around Michigan. For each honoree, there will be a video presentation



profiling his/her accomplishments, followed by the trophy presentation, and an acceptance speech.

Our chapter submitted two amazing individuals from the Lansing area, state Rep. Andy Schor and Tashmica 'Firecracker' Torok, and they were selected to be honored!

Schor has been a great leader in the Ingham County area, and as of late, on the charitable gaming issue. He has introduced legislation that would keep charitable gaming how it has been over the past few years, and supported legislation that has gone through the full Senate and House committee to make sure charities still have the option to fundraise through Texas Hold 'Em. He's extremely approachable and willing to work across the aisle to get things done.

Schor is serving his first term representing Michigan's 68th House District, which includes the city of Lansing, as well as parts of Ingham County and Lansing Township.

Some of you may remember Torok from the Nyaka AIDS Orphans Project, where she was development associate. She left Nyaka and has started her own nonprofit, The Firecracker Foundation, an organization working to honor the bravery of children who have survived sexual trauma by building a community invested in the healing of their whole being. among the most dedicated. But on Oct. 19, with the game almost done and the Lions almost losing, Glover Quin intercepted a pass, setting up Golden Tate's 73-yard touchdown catch.

Team USA Hockey, Lake Placid, 1980: I've visited the arena where the Miracle on Ice happened, and I can only imagine the energy in the building that day. The Russian team had dominated the Olympics since 1964. Nobody expected Team USA to do much of anything. After all, the team consisted of college players and players aspiring to go pro. The team had to battle the best in hockey – Finland, Czechoslovakia, Norway, Romania, and West Germany – before facing the Russians in the semi-finals. And the Russians still weren't worried. But the team took to the ice, and though they were down by a goal heading into the third period, they continued to play hard and smart. They tied at 8:39, and two minutes later, scored again to take the lead, and finally the win. This took them to the gold-medal game against Finland, which Team USA won 4-2.

She took her time and built up her leadership skills before agreeing to take the helm of the chapter as president in 2002.

Sally is the Administrative Vice President of Sohn Linen Service, Inc., which every member of the Lansing Jaycees knows is a business that does more than it's fair share to support the chapter and the community as a whole.

When asked about great memories or stories she'd like to share, Sally had this to say: "At the 2002 Beers Around the World event at Reno's East, I roped Amy Miller into singing Homer Simpson's Beer Song with me for all of

the attendees. As soon as we finished singing, she leaned close to me and said 'I can't believe I just did that. You know I'm going to kill you for that.'"

Sally's greatest take away from her time as a Jaycee is the relationships you can build with other people in the organization. She said: "I was very fortunate to have gotten to know Bob Pancost. He was the Lansing Jaycees 50th president and his contemporaries affectionately and respectfully called him "the King." Although I had a business relationship with him for some time, it was during my year as president that Bob became a valuable mentor and a cherished friend. I could call him or walk into his shop anytime, and he would take time to talk with me. It always amazed me how intuitive he was about the Jaycee issues of the day, considering he was nearly two and a half decades removed from his time as president. Bob taught me the importance of giving back to the chapter that had done so much for me, even after my active days were through."
