


November GMM

Great American Smokeout

On November 18th 2004, the American Cancer Society marks the 28th Annual Great American Smokeout, nationally recognized as a platform to educate the public on the dangers associated with tobacco use and to encourage smokers to quit for a lifetime by starting with just one day.

Smoking is the most preventable cause of death in our society; yet in 2002 an estimated 45.8 million adults in the US were smokers. Youth smoking prevalence in the US remains high; in 2001, 28.5% of US high school students were smokers.

What can you do? If you smoke, this is a great time to think about quitting. There are a lot of resources available to help. You can call me at the Michigan Department of Community Health at (517) 335-8803 to get a free quit kit with coupons for nicotine replacement therapy. If you want more intense help you can call our new quitline for free and confidential coaching to help you quit. Free nicotine replacement therapy is also available through the quitline for those who have no health insurance. That number is 1 (800) 480-QUIT. You can also check online for local classes and other resources at the Ingham County Health Department website at www.CACvoices.org. Don't forget to call the American Cancer Society at (517) 332-3300.

If you don't smoke, you can help by being a supportive person for anyone who is trying to quit. Make sure to give them lots of encouragement and positive feedback. Offer to be a person they can talk to when they are having a craving. Walking or other exercise helps quitters cope with stress and cravings. Invite them to come walking or biking with you. Give them an incentive! Tell your quitting friend that you will buy lunch or dinner for them at a smoke-free restaurant at the end of their first week of being smoke-free. Be creative! Change is hard, but you can help make a friend or family member's transition to the non-smoking world by being a positive force in their lives!

HAUNTED HOUSE DIARY

August 30th "I want an exploding heart," Jeff said. It sounded like the title of a country song. "No, this year I want to have a room with a heart that squirts blood." Thus began our first planning meeting and my odyssey into the phenomenon of the haunted attraction. It became clear early on as chairperson that creating a haunted house is a balancing act. You want to spend money on building a great house and you want to spend money on promoting the house. The haunted house is the Jaycees biggest fundraiser, which means ultimately raising money is the goal. Still, I wasn't going to dump all of our funds into promoting a lame house. I wanted a great house that would promote word of mouth advertising. I wound up getting my wish.

September 19th: Time to unload the contents of the house from the trailer. It needs to be towed to the I-5 museum. The guy from the towing company calls to tell me that there's a flat tire. He knows somebody who can fix it. After a lot of scrambling the trailer is there and we unlock it. It's a ton of work. Finally the maze is set up and decorating begins.

September 27th: People are generating ideas for the rooms. I veto a lot of them as being too graphic, expensive, or dangerous. My favorite is the idea someone got off of the Internet in which you take a live car battery and scrape the cables on a metal plate. The sparks scare the customers. This is idea is so patently hazardous I laugh out loud.

Oct 3rd: Jeff decides to put a fake corpse in a bathtub and surround it with air fresheners. He buys two dozen air fresheners and unwraps them all at once. My room is next to his and I can only work in it for 5 minutes at a time because of the fumes. For the next month I yell "Who put up these #\$%@\$ air fresheners!?!" at least five times a night.

Oct 14th: Kim and I do a radio interview about the haunted house. It goes like this:

DJ: Kim and Brian are here from the Jaycees. Brian, tell us about the Jaycees, who are you and what do you do. And of course, tell us what's happening with the haunted house this year.

Me: Well the Jaycees are a group of community volunteers . . .

DJ: Hey, thanks for coming in. Next up . . . Aerosmith!

Kim and I stick around for the next segment in which the station intern who has long rasta dreadlocks recites the lyrics to Elton John's Rocket Man in the voice of a conehead. Because it's too early in the morning and the whole thing looks so odd in person, Kim and I crack up. We can be heard over the air laughing in the background.

Oct 15th: It's opening night and I'm uneasy. Suddenly I'm seeing no upside to this project. All I see is potential liability and failure. Ironically, my nightmares have consisted of a haunted house that isn't scary at all. It rains. People still show up. Domino's donates forty pizzas and they have to be stored in my Expedition. The truck smells like pizza for the next two days. Finally I open the windows to let it air out at night. Now it's worse, as the whole garage smells like pizza.

Oct 21st: A few of us take a road trip to some of the other local haunted houses. The ballpark actually set up the display with the sparking car battery. Jeff points it out and I start laughing like a hyena (I felt kind of bad for the guy running it since he was trying to scare us).

Oct 22nd: A girl scout leader from Clare has brought 20 kids two hours south to go through the house. They are lined up in groups of five ready to go in. I tell the scout mom she has to decide if the kids are going to have flashlights or not. All 20 kids scream "No Flashlights" in unison. That made the whole night for several volunteers.

Oct 23rd: Now I'm nervous as I'm predicting that the state judges will show up for their random visit. I thought (wrongly) it would be last night. So it has to be this night. People are telling me to relax because the house is done and there's nothing you can do at this point. Unfortunately, I know something that no one else does. I've done a dozen customer walkthroughs and a lot of exit polling and I know that our timing is sporadic. I know that the quality of the house varies greatly depending on the timing of the volunteers. This makes me nervous. The Judges actually do show up. I hold the line and give direction to the volunteers. I tell the MSU students to scream their lungs out. I tell Troy that if the Judges don't see the Electric Chair, I'm going to bang my head on it until it bleeds. I drop in behind the last customers in the house trying to get a final sense of how things look. Unfortunately these people are moving incredibly slow and screwing everything up. It's like they're not walking through the house but instead puttering around like they're deciding where to hang a picture. I want to get on the PA and holler "Hey, Idiot with the baseball cap and two teenagers: This isn't a Century 21 open house. You're not buying the #\$%\$@ place so get a move on!" Finally I send the Judges through. They come out laughing. They seem to have enjoyed it. At least they saw the chair and the giant spider, so I'm happy. One of the judges specifically comments on the air fresheners being a great concept. I'm like "Um, yeah, that was a really good idea."

Oct 27th: I'm supervising with a resident physician and tell him I want him to come volunteer at the house to learn about phobias and temperaments. It's highly instructive how some people are very terrified of everything, and others are bothered by nothing. The next day at work we talk about the teaching points of the house. Three women came by and showed no anxiety at all while in line. I was puzzled until the MSU volunteers explained that they were reeking of marijuana. We also talked about how some occasional people find danger to be sexually exciting. One woman came by and stopped when I came at her with the chainsaw. She closed her eyes and smiled as the wind from the engine blew her hair around. Afterwards she said, "That was good!" (I said "No . . .that was flipping weird!")

Oct 29th: The weather is warm and we are deluged with customers. The line is starting to wind around the block. Chris comes out and suggests we start sending them through faster. I'm hesitant because I'm not sure everyone will experience the house completely if we do. I realize that I have to give up the idea of our haunted house as a beautiful and tragic form of performance art. I see the money that could be made for our chapter and all the good we do, and decide we'll wring the house like a wet mop. I speed up the line and the place is full of screaming people. It sounds like Cedar Point. People are coming out loving it, so I figure they all got their five bucks worth, even if it wasn't the optimal spook show.

Oct 31st: It's Halloween and our MSU group hasn't shown up (it turns out they went to Oldsmobile Park by mistake). We have a small handful of Jaycees to do the work of twenty-five. We decide the house will have a suspense vibe rather than the jump-out-and-scream-at-you-every-five-steps atmosphere that it usually has. It's my anniversary and my daughter's first Halloween. Sara tells me I'm not allowed to stick around. Things are so sparse that Renee and Tierany have to run from room to room, doing the job of several spooks each, and trying not to break a limb.

Nov 2nd: Our lease is running out and we don't have enough volunteers for the reload. Miraculously, somebody from one of the MSU groups is desperate to get a hold of one of our rubber masks. It turns out he and his girlfriend wore it when they volunteered and it has a lot of sentimental value. He wants to take it home and surprise her with it. He agrees to get some buddies to help us in return for the mask, the leftover soda pop and a modest stipend. Thank God for young love. We get the trailer packed, the place swept out and we lock up for the last time. Members debate who should be chairperson next year. I've just seen my 41st Halloween, which rules me out completely. It's been a lot of work but I was grateful for the experience and to all of the people who helped out.

After all, what would October be without candy corn and the smell of burning leaves? What would October be without haunted houses?
