## A Message from the Membership VP



Greetings all! This month I thought I'd tell you all a little about our billing system from the Michigan Jaycees and the US Jaycees in hopes that you can better understand our dues. Many of you wonder why you get the bill for your dues a month before your actual anniversary date. For instance, I joined the Jaycees in August, but my renewal fees are due in July. This is because the state (Jaycees) consider an on time renewal to be the month prior to your anniversary date. So why should you care if you renew on time? Our dues for the state break down like this: On Time Renewal \$50. Late Renewal \$58. New Member \$60.

Essentially, you save the chapter \$8 by renewing that month early. \$8 may not seem like much, but when you multiply that by 70 members, it comes out to \$560. That is quite a bit that we can use for operating costs. And, if you do the math, when a new member joins, our regular dues fee is only \$65, which means we are only getting \$5 of that. And that isn't even \$5, because we have to buy a nametag for each new member. Plus, our current incentives to join often make our dues for new members \$60 (at GMM's and Meet & Greets) or \$55 (at New Member Orientations). So we're actually losing money! The Lansing Jaycees have kept their dues at the same price for several years now, because we want to make sure people are able to join or renew their membership if they choose. I hope this helps you better understand why you get your renewal bill a month early, and encourages you to renew early.

### The 5.5 Secrets of Successful Delegation Pt. 2

Most of us know successful delegation is more than assigning a task to a person and hoping for the best. As with most things there is part art and part skill behind implementing this process. I have identified 5 and a half secrets behind successful delegation: proper breakdown of task, assigning the correct person, creating an open dialog, monitor progress, review and revise, and building an environment of trust. Part 1, proper breakdown of task, was covered in last month's Capitol Correspondent. The remaining elements will be shared in this and the next 4 editions of this newsletter. #### Assigning the Correct Person

Once you have properly broken down a task into manageable pieces you are ready to move towards the next step of successful delegation: assigning the correct person to each sub-task. While you may have someone in mind initially I recommend taking a step back and evaluate the situation before sending an email, visiting them in person, or calling them. Why? Strategy and growth.

Understanding the big picture of your organization and where your project impacts the big picture matters when delegating a task. For instance, you may know of a worker (employee or volunteer in your organization) who has expert skills in the area the task covers. You could delegate the task to them and have results back ahead of schedule. However, you could assign the task to another person who could learn from the experience. Look for opportunities to help others grow, especially in areas where they have interest. Lastly, be aware of commitments individuals you are considering delegating a task to may have. Naturally, this all takes communication (which is covered in depth in the next installment of the Capitol Correspondent).

Using task planning sheets and delegation logs (shown below) or using a project management program aid you in keeping track and managing assigned tasks. Using project management tools, along with thoughtful planning, and managing proper assignment of individual delegates will keep you organized. That way if (and when) something unexpected happens you are organized and can swiftly deal with challenges appropriately, often by empowering those who 'own' certain tasks to handle them, than assuming ownership of all challenges during a crisis because you are not properly organized.

Here are five questions to answer that build both your skills as well as those you work with:

- Who can do the task now?
- Who can be trained to do the task?
- What is the best match of work and individual contribution for personal growth?
- Who would most benefit from working on the task?
- What match can you make between workloads, skill development, and performance to help people grow and get the task done on time?

Once you have thoughtfully assigned tasks to appropriate individuals that balance the need for successful completion, timeliness, and individual growth you are well on your way to leveraging the third secret to successful delegation: communication and creating an environment of open dialogue. The next installment of the 5.5 Secrets to Successful Delegation in next month's Capitol Correspondent will cover this.

It's October, and Halloween is coming up. I thought you might be interested in the following alternatives to burial in a coffin:

#### Top 10 Weird Burials from totallytop10.com

- 1. Freeze Drying: The approach is freeze drying the body and crushing the remains in to a fine powder. This powder is then available for scattering or incorporating in a memorial.

### **Origins of Halloween Traditions**

Since our chapter has been working so hard these on getting the Monster Mayhem Haunted House ready for its opening day on Oct 15<sup>th</sup>, some people may not know why how traditions such as treat or treating, haunted houses and dressing up came into existence. After a little research here is what I came up with:

Halloween – October 31<sup>st</sup>: It is a mix of Celtic (Irish), Catholic and Roman religious holidays (Samhain, All Saints' Day and Feralia respectively) and European folk traditions. Around the Middle Ages, October 31<sup>st</sup> was seen as a day that the dead can return to earth and ancient Celts would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off any ghosts. By the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, it had evolved to a more of a children's holiday. The name originated around the 16<sup>th</sup> century from the Scottish term All-Hallows-Even (evening).

Jack O' Lantern: Origins come from an Irish myth about a man called Stingy Jack who double-crossed the Devil and after Stingy Jack died he was not allowed to go to either Heaven or Hell and was forced to roam the earth with only a piece of burning coal. He carved out a turnip to carry the coal and became known as "Jack of the Lantern" or "Jack O' Lantern. People in Ireland and Scotland made their own turnip lanterns with scary faces to scare away Stingy Jack and when settlers came to America, they started to use pumpkins, which are native here.

Trick or Treating: Has Irish and English origins (Middle Ages) that stem from the tradition of Souling which occurred on November 1<sup>st</sup> – All Saints' Day. Children and poor people would go door to door singing and saying prayers for the dead in exchange for a small round cake. The cake represented a soul being freed from Purgatory. Also it combines the Scottish and English tradition of Guising where children would wear costumes or disguises and go door to door for food. In Scotland children are still usually expected to perform a trick (song, joke or poem) before they receive a treat.

Haunted Houses: Surprisingly enough, though hard to officially pinpoint when haunted houses came into existence, some research has stated that they originated from Jaycee (Junior Chamber of Commerce) charity tents around the 1920's-1930's. Elements from ghost stories, carnival rides and sideshows combined with the Halloween traditions already established probably influenced their creation.
