9/11 VIGIL

On Sunday, Sept. 11, Jaycees joined together with the Lansing Fire and Police departments to honor the 10th anniversary of 9/11.

The day's events began with a Jaycee led ceremony at the state Capitol, where members of the Michigan State University ROTC presented and posted the colors and Michigan Jaycees 87th President Dave Worthams served as the emcee. Patriotic songs (*The Star Spangled Banner, America and America the Beautiful*) were performed by soloists Kristyn Ladd and Katie Allen.

At the conclusion of the first commemoration, the Central United Methodist Church downtown played *God Bless America* on its carillon bells as we walked over to the intersection of Michigan and Washington to meet up with the local departments. Led by the MSU ROTC, the large crowd that had gathered slowly made its way over to Remembrance Plaza in Wenthworth Park, where a twisted piece of steel from one of the Trade Centers stands as a memorial.

Lansing Jaycees President Angela Fossi led the approximately 200-250 attending the vigil in the *Pledge of Allegiance*. Throughout the event, members of the Lansing Fire Department Color Guard solemnly marked each attack by ringing a large silver bell.

Wreaths were presented at the base of the memorial, with Lansing Jaycees Director-at-Large Charlie Root presenting one on behalf of the Lansing Jaycees and the greater Lansing community.

Attending the vigil was gratifying. Helping plan and provide this somber, yet moving event was truly rewarding. Opening this event up to the public allowed area residents a way to reflect on and remember the events of Sept. 11, 2001. Providing this type of government and civic involvement programming is important and help fulfills a need in the community.

Are you the carrot, the egg, or the coffee bean?

A young woman went to her mother and told her about her life and how things were so hard for her. She did not know how she was going to make it and wanted to give up. She was tired of fighting and struggling.



It seemed that, as one problem was solved, a new one arose. Her mother took her to the kitchen. She filled three pots with water and placed each on a high fire. Soon the pots came to a boil. In the first, she placed carrots, in the second she placed eggs, and in the last she placed ground coffee beans.

If you are like the bean, when things are at their worst, you get better and change the situation around you. When the hours are the darkest and trials are their greatest, do you elevate to another level? How do you handle adversity? Are you a carrot, an egg, or a coffee bean?

Dispelling the Excuse of Not Competing

The November convention hosts a variety of competitions and there is still time to successfully compete in most competitions*. Competitions this quarter consist of: prepared write up, impromptu write up, Jaycee Jeopardy, debate competition, and the brand new advanced debate competition. Have you considered participating in competitions at the November convention? If not, why not? When talking about competitions with people I have heard several reasons. Most of the popular ones I have heard when talking to people about competitions are: I don't have time, I am not any good at competing, I don't know how to prepare, and I'm not going to the convention.

EXUSE 1: "I don't have enough time."

It is true; we are all busy. In fact being a busy person may be the very reason you should participate in competitions. I find most of the most interesting people I have met are those with the most diverse and often hectic schedules. While I am not sure what your schedule is like I found enough time to compete, and win, the state impromptu and prepared speak ups last year. Most of the competitions require minimal time to prepare for. In fact your busy schedule is likely an asset. Interesting people often have the widest variety of stories. These stories can be used as content or anecdotes that explain or give support to a position for all competitions except for Jaycee Jeopardy. Many such as impromptu speak up and impromptu write up require no preparation other than the ability to speak or write in English. In fact the other competitions require little preparation time though individuals certainly are encouraged to practice and prepare as much as you can. A little can go a long way. Consider investing just an hour or two every week or so. You will likely feel prepared and ready once competitions begin!

EXCUSE 2: "I am not any good at competing."

Says whom? Have you competed before at a Jaycee event? If so, how long ago was that? What did you learn? If not, why judge yourself prior to testing yourself? Perhaps you competed in high school and lost? So what? Many of today's biggest achievers suggest they got where they are today from challenging themselves, sticking their neck out there, and giving it their best shot. I challenge you to find an autobiography of a contemporary success story in the free world and show me where the subject of interest stated that they got it right on the first try, did not fail, or achieved success with ease. If you find one I'd love to learn their secret! I found the conventions I attended where I competed were the most enjoyable conventions I have attended. You and other competitors have an instant bond, thus, even though you are competitors you have made a new friend or a few. In my experience just competing sends this adrenaline rush throughout my body. Looking back I see that I felt more present and engaged in all activates and all interactions during conventions where I competed compared to those were I did not. Sticking your neck out, challenging yourself, and competing gives back more than what time and effort you invested. Don't worry about being good, show up, step up and enjoy the challenge.





EXCUSE 3: "I don't know how to prepare."

I can help! I have competed in speak ups. I am more than happy to offer tips, and perhaps an opportunity to listen and critique your speech. I also have met and become friends with people who have competed in other areas. Many of them are also willing to aid others in competitions. Rules and additional resources can be found at the Michigan Jaycees, US Jaycees, and JCI websites (below). If you are considering competing let me know. As your Individual Development Vice President it is my job to help you, help you find resources, introduce you to people who can help, or point you in the right direction. But I have to know! EXCUSE 4: "I'm not going to convention."

Have you been to a convention before? If not, why not? What are your fears? I encourage you to talk to anyone who attended convention recently. Most individuals I have talked to who attend a convention, whether their first or their tenth, come back to their home chapter with renewed excitement. They come back with a few new friends they met from chapters located in other parts of their state. They gain a better understanding of who the Jaycees are, gain new knowledge, and often have a better understanding of what they want out of their Jaycee experience. I encourage you to attend convention, whether you have gone before or not, whether this is your first month as a Jaycee or your 19th year.

Putting the FUN in FUNdraising

You may have noticed some e-mails and actions pertaining to a "haunting" that is taking place during this month of October. Since we are not doing a Haunted House this year which is a huge fundraiser for the chapter, we are instead tasked with raising additional funds in other ways. Thus the "Haunting" and a few other ideas that will be coming out as the year wraps up.

Why is it so important that we raise funds? Aren't we a nonprofit? It is true that as a nonprofit we do not typically have a lot of income that has to be generated however we do have some expenses, these include purchasing nametags for the membership, covering the cost of storage shed rental, and other expenses. In addition some of the events that we put on annually the Chapter covers the cost of. The key example of this is the Easter Egg Hunt. This is a signature event that really helps us do something for the community and allows us to get our name out every year, however even with the donations that we receive we do not make money of the event. For the Chapter to continue providing quality events like the Easter Egg Hunt, and giving back to the community we also have to fundraise for our Chapter.

So as this year progresses and as a new Management Vice President brings their ideas to the table, remember that they need your support to help with fundraising and since there are as many kinds of fundraisers as there are members you don't have to get involved in all of them just the ones that will be fun for your to participate in.

So what is this "Haunting" thing about?

During the month of October the Lansing Jaycees will be "Haunting" area yards. People can pay a small donation and have a "Haunt" delivered to a victims friends yard. Once that Haunt is there the friend can then choose the next location that the Haunt goes to. Haunts will be on a person's property for approximately 24 hours. Each person will receive notification that this Haunt is done by the Lansing Jaycees and that it is a fundraiser. If they do not wish to have the items stay on their yard for the 24hour period they can contact us and we will promptly remove the items.

A person could purchase Anti-Haunting Insurance prior to October 10th to prevent any items from being deposited in their yard. However after the October 10th deadline Ant-Haunt insurance could not be guaranteed.

A MESSAGE FROM THE TREASURER

Continuing on my cleaning trend, I have some more cleaning tips that are inexpensive and provided by the June 17th issue of <u>All You</u> magazine.

Distilled White Vinegar – An inexpensive product that is a safe and effective cleaning agent that's chemical free.

- To freshen up the fridge, clean the shelves and walls with a solution of half water and half vinegar.
- Brighten coffee cups by gently scrubbing stains with equal parts of vinegar and salt or baking soda.
- To eliminate odors in plastic containers, wipe them out with a cloth dampened with vinegar.
- Get rid of the crud on your grill by spraying a solution of half water and half vinegar onto the leftover food items.
- Instead of using Goo Gone, place a cloth soaked in vinegar on it over night (works on scissor blades too).
- Spray full-strength vinegar around the sink and tub to kill bathroom germs, wipe clean with a damp cloth after.
- To get rid of lime buildup, make a paste of 1 tsp. vinegar and 2 TBL. salt, apply to sink fixtures and rub with a cloth.
- To remove light scorch marks (not sure why you would have them....) on fabrics, rub gently with vinegar. Wipe with a clean cloth. Good news, this also works on deodorant stains.
- Remove old paint on brushes by placing them in a pot with vinegar, soak for an hour. Turn on the stove and bring the vinegar to a simmer, drain and rinse clean.
- To clean your toilet, pour one cup or more of diluted white distilled vinegar into the bowl, let it sit for several hours or overnight. Scrub well with a toilet brush and flush. Don't' forget the flushing...
- To get rid of a carpet stain (try on a test area first) make a paste of 2 TBL white distilled vinegar and ¹/₄ cup salt or baking soda. Rub the paste into the stain and let dry. Vacuum the residue up the next day.

Stay tuned for more tips and money savings ideas next month! It's fall, open your windows and air out your house...Let these tips do the cleaning for you and enjoy the weather.
